Buildings and features at risk

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Elm Grove at junction with Whetstone Lane. Sandstone wall and gatepost. Incorporates a

Victorian post-box set into the wall.



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Elm Grove, Whetstone Lane and Church Road. Sandstone wall originally forming the boundary of the Rev. Shewell's house, later the Convent. This has suffered in recent years, an area of collapse being replaced with breeze block. In Church Road, an original cast iron pedestrian gate (not clearly shown by Ordnance Survey until 1954) with traces of original paint survives, recently protected/hidden by a sheet of metal.





Location: 87 Holt Hill

Most recently used as a dance studio, this is our only remaining house built by an early 19thC Liverpool **Description:**

ship-owner. Currently for sale.





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A J Motors, Frodsham Street

A rare example of a stable block and cart store, built prior to 1874. This may well be demolished soon, which is a pity, because all other examples are long gone.






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Location: 140 and 144 Church Road

Description: An ancient building now used by a fencing

manufacturer, this building was the blacksmith's premises for the village. Behind and above it is another old building used by a builders' merchant.



85 to 91 Greenway Road and Tower Road A terrace, the ground floor of which were outbuildings belonging to Tranmere Hall; the upper storey being added in the 19thC to create the existing houses. Behind them, a length of tall sandstone wall is the sole surviving portion of the mediæval wall forming the southern boundary of the grounds of Tranmere Hall.





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Junction of Derby Road with Whetstone Lane A cast-iron item of street furniture thought to enclose electrical boosting facilities used to assist trams on the steep slope.

1 Greenway Road (Elm Cottage) An early 19thC vernacular farmhouse with sturdy red sandstone gateposts and dwarf walls – a rare **Description:**

survivor for the locality.






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St Catherine's Church Institute, Church Road Built in 1892, it had a capacity of about 600 people and is now used by the Scout movement.





Location: Clifton Park **Description**: Now a cons

Now a conservation area, the laying out of the estate was started in about 1843. Many of its buildings are at risk from neglect and the integrity of the conservation area as a whole is threatened by inadequate local planning authority control. Location: Ubiquitous

Description: Cast iron road name plates, c.1950. These should be

protected and conserved, with special priority given to those within the Clifton Park Conservation Area; fixed to or within the setting of listed buildings, or on

sandstone walls.




Location: Central Library, Borough Road

Description: Built in 1934 to replace the former central library (one

of three Carnegie libraries built in the town), which dated from 1856 and was demolished to make way

for the first Mersey road tunnel (Queensway).



Location: 367 to 375 Borough Road

Description: A rare example of almost unaltered Victorian

commercial architecture dating from about 1890, with

an oriel window and cupola at each corner of the

principal elevation.





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
Location: 377 to 391 Borough Road


Description: Another relatively good example of terraced

commercial development. Most of the buildings date from about 1890 but the handsome terracotta façade

is a later addition, dating from about 1911.







Location: 7 Elm Grove

Description: Childhood home of the war poet, Wilfred Owen, from

1900 to 1903. The building displays a blue plaque

testifying to this fact.



Location: 14 Willmer Road

Description: Childhood home of the war poet, Wilfred Owen, in

1903. The building does not display a blue plaque

testifying to this fact.




Location: 51 Milton Road


Description: Childhood home of the war poet, Wilfred Owen, from

154 Whetstone Lane.

A cottage reached only by a footpath from Whetstone Lane. Tests on its roof timbers produced a dendrochronology date of around 1500. If not reused from an earlier building, this suggests that the cottage is one held by the Prior of Birkenhead to oversee his landholding on Holt Hill, as well as his ancient woodland below, now developed as The Woodlands.





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Alleyway between Whetstone Lane and Raffles Road Two early 20thC cast iron bollards of identical design. A square base with obliquely incised corners creating inwardly tapering vertical panels, octagonal in section and defined by thin vertical banding extending from a thin octagonal band near the base and then flaring above a 1" rope-shaped horizontal band to a 2" octagonal band with rounded edges. Topped by an octagonal dome, displaying a fine, smooth patina. One further band in the centre of the vertical panels with eight badges, each decorated with the same four-petal flower motif.



Mersey Park and Lodge

Municipal park, opened 1885. The yellow sandstone gateposts and walls are identical in design to those in Birkenhead Park (opened 1847). All of the original cast iron railings are missing and substantial damage has been inflicted upon most of the gateposts and walls by vandals. The character and appearance of the newly refurbished lodge has been substantially diminished by the insertion of uPVC windows.
